### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Swa.Sawarkar Mahavidyalya, Beed affiliated to Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University; Aurangabad is an aided college of Arts, Science and Commerce. The college takes effors for empowerment of youth through value based and quality education. It is established in 1995 and governed by Bhartiya Shikshan Prasarak Sanstha, Ambajogai. The sanstha have 42 units imparting education from nursery to post graduate degree level. The establishment of Bhartiya Shikshan Prasarak Sanstha, Ambajogai, Dist. Beed itself is for the noble cause of providing quality and value based education facilities in the relatively backward region of Marathwada. It strongly believes that education is the powerful instrument to bring desired social transformation. *Vidyasabha*, an academic forum, empowers and monitors all activities of the institute meant for achieving the goal of the Sanstha. The sacrifice of the founder members is the inspiration for stakeholders.

The college believes in imparting quality education and its assurance in an organized manner. Well-planned academic activities with Computer Aided Learning are the salient feature that keeps us dyanamic. Majority of students enrolled in the college belongs to the lower to middle socio-economic status and and are from rural background. The functitioning of the collegeinvolves catering needs of such students. Stakeholders supports by contributing in planning and execution of activities.

Office automation is the area of interest facilitating the students for smooth deals. Library as a Knowledge Resource Center always provide ample resources including computer facilities, e books and journals.

### **Curricular Aspects**

Being an affiliated college, Swa Sawarkar Mahavidyalaya follows the curriculum designed by the affiliating university Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad. The college offers 28 departments representing three faculties. The range of subjects offered by the college reflects the efforts taken towards ensuring academic flexibility. It offers 17 programs in Arts, 10 in Science and the faculty of Commerce. Wide range of subject combinations is made available for the students. Undergraduate degree programs with the subjects Sanskrit, Psychology, Philosophy, and Geography in Arts faculty; Microbiology, Chemistry, and Computer Science in the Science faculty along with other conventional subject are available in the college. Commerce Faculty is well established. Three need basedskill promoting Career Oriented Programs (COP)coursesare run with core and elective options.

Honorable President of Vidyasabha and Ex-Secretary of the institution and other ten faculties have contributed and are involved in designing and development of curriculum as a member of Senate, Faculty, Board of Studies of the university.

The institution develops and deploys action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum. Annual teaching and co-curricular plan is

prepared at the beginning of the year. IQAC plays important role in implementation and assurance of quality.

The opportunities are provided for the students to have exposure and interactions with the industry and research bodies in the form of invited talks of the researchers and industry personnel and visits to industries. Study tours, visits to various institutes, field work, etc are arranged by the concerned departments.

The institute encourages teachers to participate in Orientation, Refresher Courses, faculty development programs, trainings and UGC sponsored programmes. Almost 100% Teachers have participated in such capacity building programmes.

The college follows the systematic pattern of obtaining feedback from the students, alumni, parents, academicians, on curriculum. In this regard, 'Teacher Guardian Scheme' play additional major role as a formal mechanism.

### **Teaching Learning and Evaluation**

College strictly follows the rules and regulations regarding the reservation policy for socially and economically deprived classes according to directives of university and Government of Maharashtra. Wide publicity to admission process ensures the transparency and commitment of the institute to provide access of education to all sections of society.

Teaching learning process is carefully planned and executed by the teachers.IQAC plays a significant role for quality assuranceof teaching learning and evaluation activities.

Majority of the teachers in the college are well qualified and experienced and are permanent. The number of PhD and MPhil holder teachers is 17 and 23 respectively. There is considerable rise in last four years in the number of teachers who completed Ph.D. Nineteachers are recognized by the university as Research Guide for Ph.D. research. Some are recognized as Post Graduate teachers by the university and act as visiting faculties. Teachers have published books those are useful as a course material for the students. Participative methods like group discussions, seminars, home assignments, projects, wall papers, sky observation, study tours, visits, etc are practiced so as to develop critical thinking, independent learning and collaborative learning among students. Teachers adopt different techniques knowing the learning needs of students through formative assessment. Remedial course were run for needy students. Time is spared by the teachers through contact hours for slow learners. Necessary assistance is provided to advance learners to participate in regional and state level competitions.

The college makes available modern teaching and learning means for Computer Aided Learning such as audio-video, animations, educational charts and models to explaining various concepts. The college invested on highly sophisticated instrumentation for laboratories.

Library provides ample resources for students and teachers by means of reference books, journals and periodicals. INFLIBNET and remote access to university library facilities are available in the library. Network Resource Center facilitates free and unlimited access to internet for students and

faculties. Teacher- Guardian Scheme is the exclusive identity of the institute practiced from its inception and makes teaching learning process smooth. In this, teacher acts as a mentor, friend-philosopher and guide, for a group of students.

Entire evaluation process is governed according to the rules of the university. College readily adopts the reforms implemented by the university time to time. Examination Cell of the college is with necessary support facilities. It rigorously monitors the entire evaluation process and maintains necessary secrecy and transparency in the process. Grievances of the students are sorted out by the university. In this regard, necessary follow upand assistance is provided by the college. Performance of the students on evaluation is analyzed and considered for further improvements.

### Research, Consultancy, Extension and Collaborations

College encourages and extends all possible facilities to promote research activities through Research Committee. Teachers of this college are involved in research for improvement in their own capacity as well as creation of knowledge. The number of teachers having Ph.D. degree is 17 and majority of others have registered for their Ph.D. Within next two years almost all the faculties will complete Ph.D. degree. Faculty members actively participate in conferences, seminars and workshop and to present their research work. Participation of the staff and students in level seminars and conferences gives an academic outlook. Students from the department of Microbiology and Economics have published their research in national level journals.

Adequate infrastructure is provided by the institution for smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects and other research initiatives. Internet, INFLIBNET, WI-Fi facility, journals and e-journals subscriptions, NRC and other facilities are made available to all faculties and students in research activities.

To promote research based activities, college has organized three national level, two state level, one university level and one regional level conferences and seminars in different subjects. The faculty members are actively involved in the research. Two Minor Research Projects are ongoing in the department of Marathi and Physics, Four Minor Research Projects are completed.

The faculty members are encouraged for rendering consultancy services in the various areas like academic, financial, literacy, competitive examinations, research, etc. They extend honorary as well as paid consultancy services to the community by sharing expertise, knowledge and experience. A sense of responsibility makes them partake in social work at various levels. The college has generated revenue through these services. The college has Career Guidance and Placement Cell active by means of notices, expert lectures and workshops. The Department of Commerce has provided placements in industries through campus interviews. Department of Microbiology helps students by providing opportunities of off campus placements in industries.

The college boasts of excellent record of accomplishment with respect to extension activities in the different categories like Community development, social work, health and hygiene awareness, health camp, adult education and literacy, blood donation camp, environment awareness, Gender sensitization,

etc. A neighboring village *Waybatwadi* has been adopted for overall development. Students visit the local old age home, school for the blind/orphanage, on important festivals.

Stakeholder perception on the overall performance of the institution is solicited through feedback from students, parents, alumni. The NSS, LLLED and Women Cell units organize extension programmes like cleaning campaign, plantation, literacy mission, community health/ blood donation camps/prevention of drug addiction, AIDS awareness, women and childcare, rallies National Youth Day, etc. The Cell forwomen addresses issues regarding women staff and students, primarily fostering their social responsibilities and imparting information about sexual harassment. It takes initiatives for guidance and counseling of women students. Extension activities ensure the growth of students with awareness of responsible and humane citizens. The college promotes campus-cleanliness drive among students. Surveys for welfare of the society are undertaken by the college. Formal/informal collaborations with different institutes for the research and other activities are found supportive.

The college has established formal/informal links with schools, laboratories, industries and NGOs for rendering services to the society and the students. Community and extension service are integrated with the curriculum as extended opportunities to help, serve and learn. The field-trips and extension activities make the students aware of their Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR) and commitment.

### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

Infrastructure and Learning resources facilitate effective implementation of teaching & learning processes. The college has good physical facilities to run the educational programs with administrative support. The facilities are augmented time to time and are being utilized optimally. The classrooms are with proper ventilation; light apart from this every classroom can be facilitated withComputer Aided Learning by means of portable projectors. The laboratories are well equipped laboratories; Computer facilities with internet connectivity available in the college make teaching and learning effective and joyful. The college has ICT facility supported by LCD projectors, Multimedia learning, Wi-Fi connectivity and unlimited internet access. The Institute frequently upgrades its facilities. The teachers are provided with the requisite facilities for preparation of computer aided teaching learning material. The office is fully computerized with allied software for smooth and efficient performance.

The fully computerized library is stocked with reference books, journals, e-books, e-journals and library resources. The library has additional facilities such as reprography and internet. It helps the teachers and the students to undertake the study and research activities. The library advisory committee monitors the availability of infrastructural and academic requirements. The college has well equipped laboratories with sophisticated instrumentation. The library, administrative block and laboratories are with Uninterrupted Power Supply system to back up electric supply.

The college consciously promotes sports culture among students. Students participate actively at regional, state and national level sports and games events. Facilities for indoor and outdoor games have created reputation. First aid facility takes care of causality, if any. An infrastructural design facilitates differently abled students. Sufficient budgetary provision is made for maintenance and utilization of physical, academic support facilities-library, sports and computer. Canteen and ladies common room facilities have been provided. The college takes care of instrumentation and other maintenance periodically.

### **Students Support and Progression**

The college is making all efforts in making available necessary support services to the students. In fact inculcating different skills among the students is the tradition of the institute. In addition to the excellent academic support, the college avails a wide range of sports, games, cultural, extracurricular and career oriented activities to the students. Several students have won prizes at university level inter college competitions. The college runs coaching classes for competitive examinations.

Language departments run forum titled 'Wangmay Mandal' to run literature oriented activities for budding writers and poets while the Department of Psychology runs Counseling Center and provides consultancy services.

The institution publishes its updated prospectus. It is a comprehensive document that covers all student needed information. All this information is also available on college website <a href="www.sawarkar.co.in">www.sawarkar.co.in</a> along with provision of online registration.

All the facilities to receive the central and state government scholarships are made available to the students. Cash awards to the meritorious students from faculties motivate students. Support to the students from SC/ST category is given in the form of reservation in admission, remedial coaching, Entry in Services Scheme. A ramp facility is available for differently abled students. Health checkup camps are organized periodically in the college. Slow learners are identified by formative assessment and support is given through remedial classes. College has made available various counseling services like academic, personal and career counselling.

Different committees are formed to encourage, guide and train the students to participate in competitions at various levels. Special books, computers with free internet facility, coaching programmes, sport kits, relaxation in attendance etc. are the other facilities provided for the same. The Competitive Examination Cell, Career Guidance cum Placement Cell and the Entry in Services Scheme facilitate the student to prepare for competitive examinations and to grab the job opportunities too. Library provides recent editions of books, e-books and journals, good number of titles and Network Resource Center. The college is absolutely free from ragging and maintains calm and healthy atmosphere.

The college has its unique policies and strategies for encouraging the students to participate in extracurricular and co-curricular activities. Cultural and Sports Committee provide ample opportunities to students for expression of their talent through participation in various competitions and programmes. Different certificate courses run by the college and various workshops organized are proved to be helpful in the development of skills among students. More exposure to the student is given by organizing educational tours, industrial visits and lectures of experts from reputed institutions and industries.

The college annually publishes a multi lingual magazine named 'Kaustubh' in which the students participate passionately. Publication of wall magazine 'Gaurav' is a regular activity of the college. Eminent academicians, poets, historians and scientists have visited the college.

Student's Council is formed in the college every year as per the university act and directions given by the Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad. The college has constituted an Anti-Ragging Committee, Student Grievance and Redressal Cell. The Vishakha Samitee in the college has been formed to check and resolve issues concerning sexual harassment of students and women at work.

The college takes efforts to reduce the dropout rate through 'Student Guardian Scheme'. As a result of all the initiatives taken by the college, a considerable number of students abledto crack competitive examinations, SLET and NET examinations on completion of their further studies. Some of the students are emerged as successful entrepreneurs. College has also generated university rankers and national players in Kabaddi, Cross-country and Hockey.

The college is in regular touch with the retired teachers, other stakeholders and seeks advice on the academic performance and growth of the institution from them.

### Governance, Leadership and Management

The college is governed by Bharatiya Shikshan Prasarak Sanstha, Ambajogai under the supervision of Local Management Committee. The Vision, Mission and Goals are clear, stated and communicated to all. The interaction of the management with staff is good and helps in the progress of the college

There is a sound co-ordination and understanding between Sanstha and the college. The college activities are performed through Principal, Vice Principal, Heads of the Departments and other teachers. Decisions are always participatory. Academic, administrative, curricular, co-curricular and extra curricular activities are monitored by different committees. The activities are planned, monitored and implemented carefully. Review of all activities is taken periodically. Efforts are made for the professional development of teaching and non teaching staff.

Performance appraisal of staff is regularly made. The issues like budget, finance, resources and utilization of funds are monitored by Local Management Committee. ### 1.1 CURRICULUM PLANNING AND IMPLEMENTATION

Sawarkar Mahavidyalaya, Beed is located in Marathwada region of Maharashtra state and is affiliated to Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad. Some of the devoted teachers and prominent citizens from the society came together and established the institution 'Bhartiya Shikshan Prasarak Sanstha' at Ambajogai in June 1951. For effective implementation of curriculum, the institution develops and deploys action plan through;

### • Academic Calendar:

Before the commencement of every academic year, the institution prepares institutional academic calendar.

### • Time Table:

The Academic Committee prepares the time table as per the structure of curriculum of the affiliating University.

### • Teaching Plans:

Each faculty prepares teaching plan for first and second term separately. The HoDs take the review of teaching plan.

Implementation of the plan is reviewed through monthly reports from lesson note book.

### • Academic Diary

The Institution provides Academic diary to each faculty to maintain daily record of teaching —learning and Evaluation. Faculty has to maintain it regularly and is verified weekly by the Vice-principal and monthly by the Principal.

### • Teaching Methods:

The curriculum is effectively imparted through conventional chalk and talk method as well as effective regular presentations, seminars, group discussions, assignments, practical work, in-house projects. Innovative teaching methods such as smart board as an adition to ICT are used wherever necessary. Educational and industrial visits are also arranged.

### • Tests ,Tutorials and Examination

Subject wise tests and tutorials as per university patorn are conducted. Results are immediately communicated and students are given directives for the improvement.

At the end of the semester the university conducts examination.

Practical and oral exams of the respective subjects are conducted at the end of the year .

### Interactions

At the end of the term, meeting is organized with college management and staff members through IQAC to interact the deployment and outcomes.

#### Feedback:

Feedback on curriculum is taken from staff in their departmental meeting Feedback from students and suggestions of other stakeholders on curriculum are considered for effective implementation of curriculum.

Six teachers from the college are directly involved in the designing and development of curriculum as the member of Board of Studies of the university. As the part, the teacher member of the college tries to emphasize designing of the curriculum which can be smoothly operationalized for improved skills and employability of the students. The attempts are also made to design and develop the curriculum to address the needs of the local society. In order to make the student competent to face competitive examinations, objective type test questions are incorporated in the evaluation system which also helps them to make in-depth study of the subject.

Teachers have active participation in the workshops organized by the university on curriculum designing and implementation. Accordingly, teachers give suggestions for curriculum content considering feedback from student and stakeholders. Also, teachers discuss on curriculum improvement with fellow teachers, experts and BOS members frequently through informal communications. Teachers maintain formal and informal contacts with BOS members to share their views and ideas about improved curriculum.

1.1.7 Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the affiliating university) by it? If, yes, give details on the process (Needs Assessment, design, development and planning) and the courses for which the curriculum has been developed.

The college has designed and developed the curricula for Career Oriented Programme (COP) sanctioned by UGC. It includes

- Certificate Course in Industrial Chemistry
- Certificate Course in Advertisement and Salesmanship
- Certificate Course in Communicative English

The process of curriculum development:

### 1. Need Assessment:

Discussion with various industries & professionals enabled us to understand the needs of the curricular contents which are crucial in the view of skill development and lacunas in the present curriculum. The industrialists and professionals suggest ideas regarding the opportunities in future for designing the course content.

### 2. Curriculum Design:

Meetings with the professionals and agencies were conducted specially for obtaining ideas about the curriculum of various courses to be started in the college. Also, the syllabus framed by other universities and institutions considered to arrive at the final curriculum design. The inputs in various courses were finalized after a detailed discussion with the experts in teaching and practical field.

### 3. Development and Planning

The finalized curriculum is then sent to the University for approval. On approval the curriculum is implemented. A detailed plan for the execution is prepared by the concerned faculties. Utmost care is taken to cover all aspects and to attain the objectives.

### 1.1.8 How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

College analyses and ensures the planning and implementation of the stated objective of curriculum by periodical reviews through IQAC and staff meeting, monthly reports of the syllabus completion and through informal talks with teachers and students. ### 1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?'

- The institution has SMS service, through which the important dates and procedure regarding admissions are communicated to the students With these efforts, college ensure its commitment about providing facility of education to all students from different social and economic group.

#### 2.2 CATERING TOSTUDENT DIVERSITY

### 2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently abled students and ensure adherence to government Policies in this regard?

College always cares about the needs of differently abled students. Following are facilities provided to those students:

- There is provision of ramp at the entrance of the college.
- Administrative block, library and most of the laboratories are on the ground floor.
- Adequate number of audio-visual equipments for teaching-learning process.
- Counseling for active involvement.
- Awareness about various schemes from central and state government for differently abled students.
- Scholarships, free ships and payment of fee in installments are some of the benefits provided to differently abled student.
- These students have direct access to office and library.

#### 2.2.2 Doestheinstitution assessthe students' needs in? Termsof knowledge and skills before the commencement of theprogramme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes, the Institution assesses student needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme through:

- Informal talks with students.
- Introductory lectures and interactions with students to understand and assess the students interest, knowledge depth, skills and their future plans.
- Previous year exam marks are taken in to consideration for counseling.
- Students are attached to teacher, guardian and the weaker students are traced out and further they are counseled.

# 2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge / Remedial / Add on / Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

Teachers know the academic background of the students during interactions at laboratories, classrooms, library etc. Knowing learning needs of the students, following strategies are adopted

- Student from different academic background that required for the concerned course are noticed and necessary curriculum is designed for them.
- For these students teachers spare required number of lectures at the beginning of academic year for the purpose of recapping and up gradation of knowledge.
- Teachers spare time for the discussion with students other than class room teaching.
- Teachers provide reading material to slow learners.

- Short period courses are designed so as to bridge the gap and cope up with the present programme.
- Advanced learners are given additional home assignments, tutorials and motivated to deliver seminars on different topics.
- Students are asked to prepare model answers of university question papers under the guidance of teacher.
- Provision of contact hours also enables in this regards especially dealing with the needs of slow learners.

## 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

This college is of co-education type. Institute ensures opportunity to everyone irrespective of caste, creed, religion, gender etc.

College sensitizes staff and students on issues such as equity, gender, environment etc. through various activities organized by different forums.

## 2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special Educational / learning needs of advanced learners?

Advanced learners are identified through performance in the qualifying examinations and classroom interactions.

Following activities are organized by various teaching departments for advanced learners:

- Providing additional knowledge resources like reference books, e-books and e-Journals.
- Providing internet facility to get additional information about the subject.
- Additional home assignments and tutorials.
- Encouraging students to deliver seminars on syllabus related topics.
- Visits to industries, research institutes, etc.
- Advanced learners are asked to refer various publications and magazines.
- They are encouraged to participate in research paper presentation competitions and poster competitions at college, district, university, state and national level.
- Participation in various competitions.
- Special guidance for various competitive examinations through competitive examination and guidance cell.

# 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyse and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programmeduration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. Who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

Information on academic performance of the student at risk of drop out is collected, analyzed and the same data is used by the institution to improve academic performance of students as follows:

- Necessary information regarding academic, social, economic, financial background of the students is obtained through admission form.
- Students with different academic background other than course requirement and having minimum performance at the qualifying examinations are advised to attend remedial classes.
- Awareness through display of notices about different scholarships and free ships for socially backward class and physically challenged students.

- College offers concession and instalments in payments of fees to avoid drop outs of students from economically weaker section of society.
- Learning friendly facilities like ramps, railings, audio-visual aids, software etc in order to meet the needs of physically challenged students.
- Girl students generally discontinue their studies after marriage. Facultiesconvincethemandtheir guardians to continue their studies even after marriage.

#### Teacher Guardian scheme

This scheme is the exclusive identity of the college. In this scheme, teacher works as a mentor (friend, philosopher and guide) for a group of students. Mentor teacher through his/her interaction with the student and visits at home, builds a rapport with student and guardian. This enables to avoid drop outs of all types of students.

#### 2.3 TEACHING-LEARNING PROCESS

## 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blueprint, etc.)

Academic Calender

- University declares academic calendar for affiliated colleges at the end of the preceding academic year or at the very beginning of the present academic year. This circular comprise period of vacation, public holidays, days of special importance, tentative examination schedule etc.
- In light of these guidelines, In Charge of teaching learning and IQAC prepare academic calendar showing month wise available teaching days.
- Academic calendar is comunicated to all concerned through e-mail. Teaching Plan:
- Time table is prepared and displayed on notice board.
- Syllabus and paper pattern are introduced to the students in the beginning of every academic year.
- Every department organize meeting for distribution of papers, annual planning of curricular and co-curricular activities at the beginning of academic year.
- Faculty members prepare their annual teaching plan and submit it to IQAC through their heads of the department.
- Faculty members maintain daily teaching diary.
- Report is submitted by every teacher at the end of month, term and academic year.
- Principal and HODs oversee that faculty members adhere to the academic calendar and teaching plan.
- Regular meetings are conducted to take the review of the academic calendar.
- Suggestion and corrective measures are discussed in the Departmental / staff meetings.
- Schedule of test tutorials, seminars, visits, guest lectures and other cocurricular activities is finalized in the departmental meetings and executed accordingly.

#### **Evaluation**

- Performance of student is evaluated by the university through examination.
- University conducts examination in semester pattern.
- University communicates the tentative dates of examination at the beginning of the academic year.
- Performance of students in these examination is evaluated by examiners at District wise Central Assessment Center [D-CAS]
- Results are generally declared within 40 days by the university.
- College also conducts its own internal evaluation, schedule of which is communicated to students by respective departments.
- Continuous evaluation of students is done by the Institution through
- Home assignments
- Classroom interactions

#### 2.3.2 How doesIQAC contributeto improve theteaching-learning process?

IQAC plays significant role in improving teaching learning process. Following are the practices so as to make teaching learning process more meaningful:

- Organization of orientation program for teachers to acquire professional skills.
- Motivation lecture series organized annually, triannually to inculcate values like professional ethics, national integration, and social harmony and to imbibe vision, goals and missions of the parent institute.
- Workshops are arranged to impart professional skills and methodologies.
- Organization of sessions to promote use of ICT.
- Induction sessions for newly appointed teachers.
- Various formats are developed to gather information regarding curricular and co-curricular activities.
- Lecture sessions are organized to sensitize faculty member about their assigned duties and responsibilities.
- Faculties are motivated to participate in activities and functions useful for their professional development. Functioning of IQAC is supported by the intellectual inputs by brain storming sessions held at forum 'Vidyasabha.' Vidyasabha is the academic forum, practiced from the establishment of the college.
- Management of the institute through IQAC undertake academic audit of every teaching faculty once in the academic year. During this, SWOC analysis of every individual is discussed to overcome weakness and to achieve necessary competency to grab opportunities. Recommendations of the management are communicated to the concerned teacher.
- Feedback from students is taken formally and informally which is also helpful in improving teaching learning process.

# 2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Teaching learning process is made student centric by following ways:

- Question-Answer sessions
- Group discussions on various topics
- Motivating students to deliver seminars on various topics related to syllabus
- Excursion tours and visits
- Publication of wall papers edited by a group of students under supervision of concerned teacher.
- Organizing different competitions and co-curricular events with active involvement of students.
- Library sessions and book exhibitions.
- Tutorials and project on different topics
- Use of models and animations by students and faculties
- Home assignments
- Notifying the topics to be delivered in advance to the students along with the references

#### Support structure and system available for teachers:

- Infrastructural facilities are optimally utilized by the teaching faculties to transform their ideas into activities with fruitful results.
- *Vidyasabha* provides suitable mechanism by means of free and frank interactions among faculty members through meetings of different committees and departments. These committees are constituted at the beginning of every academic year.
- Faculties are also free to interact with college and Sanstha authorities to solve their difficulties.
- Meetings of the committees and Heads of the departments are arranged periodically.

- Reference books, encyclopedia and other learning resources in library
- Educational CDS and software
- Seminars
- Projects
- Home assignments

## 2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

Teachers use following methodologies so as to develop habit of critical thinking among students.

- Group discussion on articles published in newspaper or magazines
- Brain storming sessions
- Ouestion-answer sessions

In the month of *Ashwin* during nine days of *Sharad iyaNawratraMahotsav*, students are motivated to participate in group discussion sessions on critical issues like ecological problems; energy crisis, water scarcity, addiction habits, feticide, character crisis etc and probable solutions are also discussed.

- Societal problems are experienced by visiting a village Wayabbatwadi, Tq. Dist. Beed, which is adopted by the parent institute BharatiyaShikshanPrasarakSanstha, Ambajogai for *BharatiyaVivekgram*.
- Survey method is used to identify problems and discussed for solutions.
- Creativity among students is nurtured by following activities:
- Organizing different competitions in college.
- Motivating students to participate in different college, university or National level competitions.
- Expressing their views by putting an article in wall papers or college annual magazine.
- Participation in different activities during annual social gathering SawarkarMahotsay
- Students are motivated to participate in regional, state and national level seminars and conferences along with their teachers.
- Teachers frequently orient students to remain thirsty for knowledge.
- Students are directed to read the biographies.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtuallaboratories, e-learning-resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National MissiononEducation through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobileeducation, etc.

#### Technologies and facilities available for effective teaching:

Teachers deliver their talk by power point presentations for which necessary technological support is available.

- Every classroom can be made audio visual room as per the requirement of the lecture by the use of portable projectors. The said projector is handy and very convenient to play.
- Free and unlimited internet facility is available for students and teachers to collect necessary learning resources.
- INFLIBNET and N-list facility is available; teachers use these facilities to enrich their knowledge
- Library has a collection of 4898 reference books, 34 journals in addition to 97000 e books and 600 e-journals
- College has good collection of audio visual CD's.
- Teachers are also aware about National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology [NME-ICT]

## 2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

Students and faculties are exposed to advance level of knowledge and skills by following ways:

- Teaching faculties participate in orientation and refresher courses organized by different Universities throughout India.
- Teachers participate in short term courses like research methodology, use of ICT for effective teaching etc so as to acquire necessary professional skills.
- Teachers participate in courses related to personality development, soft skill development, disaster management etc. organized by different institutes and organizations.
- Parent institute BharatiyaShikshanPrasarakSanstha, Ambajogai organizes short duration camps and lecture series for teaching faculties.
- Sessions so as to impart soft skills are arranged for newly appointed teachers.
- Majority of faculty frequently attends seminars, conferences, workshops, symposia where they present their own research findings and interacts with eminent academicians.
- Teachers from different departments meets informally and share / exchange their ideas and views on the topics arriving at the interface of two subject areas.
- Some departments have jointly designed short term courses of interdisciplinary nature for students.
- Guest lectures are organized frequently as a part of enrichment of the syllabus.

- Eminent personalities from different walks of life are invited so as to enlighten students and faculty members on different domain of knowledge.
- In its short span of 20 years, college has organized three national, two state level, four regional, one institutional level and several college level seminars/conference/ workshops successfully. All these events observed enthusiastic participation and fruitful deliberations.
- The parent institute BharatiyaShikshanPrasarakSanstha has hosted *ShikshakSahityaSammelan*, a promotional activity for teachers acquiring literary skills and *SamarasataSahityaSammelan* with motto 'Literature for Social Harmony'.
- Students regularly give seminars on curriculum related topics as well as on recent advances in the topics.
- Students participate in activities like poster competitions, science talent search examinations etc organized by college or other institutes.

## 2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students\benefitted) on the Academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/ mentoring/ academic advise) provided to students?

College keenly observes the needs of admitted students and provides necessary academic, personnel and psycho-social support and guidance services in following ways:

#### **Academic support**

- Reading room connected to library with ample learning resources is available
  on every working day. Teaching halls are also used as reading rooms during
  preparation days.
- Free access to students for Network resource centre to collect E- learning resources.

- Teaching faculty by means of contact hour spares definite time to interact with lager as well as advanced learners.

#### **Psycho-social support**

- College through its psychology department runs a counselingcenter.
- Counseling to girl students is provided by senior lady teachers in consultation with psychology department by arranging sessions at the beginning of academic year. During this, information regarding health and law is provided by invited speakers.

#### **Mentor system**

- Teacher Guardian Scheme is the unique identity of the college based mainly on the concept of teacher as mentor of the student. At the beginning of academic year, in- charge of this scheme allots a group of students to each teacher.
- He / she build a necessary rapport with these students and their parents by visiting their homes or by cellphones. Mentor teacher is supposed to be a friend, philosopher and guide for this group of students and knows their difficulties owing to socio- economical family background of students.

#### **Guidance services**

College provides guidance to students in following ways.

- Knowing aptitude, admission committee guide students to choose faculty and optional subjects.
- College runs 'competitive examination cell' to guide students for entry in services in state and national level competitive examinations.
- Guidance for PG entrance test.
- Workshops on writing, presentation and interview techniques are organized to develop soft skills.
- Knowing potentials and weaknesses, during interactions through teacher guardian scheme: teacher advice students about career opportunities.
- Career and Councelling Cell

# 2.3.8 Providedetailsofinnovative teaching approaches/method Adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty toadoptnew a dinnovativeapproaches and the impact of such innovative practiceson student learning?

Innovative teaching methods/approaches practiced by the faculties during last four years are:

- Interaction with students on current social, economical, environmental issues.
- Discussions are held by providing additional e-resources to students.
- Teachers suggest different internet sites and reference books so that students get additional information about the topic.
- Institute through IQAC encourage faculty to adopt innovative approaches and provide necessary infrastructural support.
- E- Classrooms, Language Lab and IT Lab are available to make teaching learning process more innovative.

#### Impact of this can be listed as

- Students are well versed in using internet facility and are able to gather information / learning material through internet.
- This helps enhancing self learning abilities and knowledge level of the student.
- Discussion on current issues promotes habit of critical thinking among students.
- Sensitization of students about social and environmental issues connects them emotionally with the surrounding environment and society which is reflected in behavioral pattern.
- Students are exposed to various knowledge resources and through it improvement in positive behavioral changes are observed.
- Progressive changes in academic results are noticed.
- Development of professional attitude is increased among the students.

### 2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching- learning Process?

The library resources are used to augment the teaching-learning process in the manner below:

- College library has a collection of good number of text books, references, journals and periodicals.
- Encyclopedia on different topics is available for reference.
- Books with latest edition and magazines are purchased by the college on regular basis for knowledge upgradation.
- News papers and periodicals are available in good number.
- The information regarding new arrivals is displayed by the library.
- Reading material is available for the students and faculty through OPAC.
- Photocopier cum scanner service is provided.
- Special help is rendered to rankers and students preparing for various competitions.
- There is a facility of Network Resource Center under the supervision of library by means of which an open access to internet is given for faculty and students
- Online resources like N list and INFLIBNET are available for teachers and students.
- Educational CDs and DVDs on different topics are available for students and teachers.
- A reading room facility
- Copies of syllabi prescribed by the university are available to students for ready reference.
- Previous University Question Papers are available for student in the form of soft copy
- Departments arrange library sessions and book exhibitions for students.

- Academic calendar giving information about number of working days and available teaching days is sent by e-mail to faculty members in the beginning of the academic year.
- In light of this academic calendar, teachers keenly work out/ prepare their annual teaching plan and execute accordingly.
- Students are also made aware and advised to cope up with these circumstances by following time to time instructions given by faculty.
- All necessary arrangements are made so as to spare required teaching days for completing the curriculum.
- Faculty who attends RC/OP in academic period; complete their syllabus by taking extra lectures on working days and even on holidays.
- The faculty has to submit monthly teaching report which helps in better execution of the curriculum.
- Teaching schedule disturbed due to unpredicted reasons is compensated by arranging extra lectures.

- Teaching learning process is monitored and evaluated by administrative officials and through IQAC.

#### **Strategies for Recruitment:**

- Subject wise workload is approved every year in the month of October by Joint Director, Higher Education, Governmentof Maharashtra, which is communicated to parent institute BharatiyaShikshanPrasarakSanstha, Ambajogai.
- Institute plans to fill up vacant posts taking into account guidelines of the reservation policy of State and Central Government.
- The roster system of state government is strictly adhered by the management.
- Before publishing an advertisement in Leading Newspapers, approval to the same is obtained from university and State Government.
- Affiliating university constitutes a selection committee by choosing members from the panel of experts as per the guidelines of UGC, university and State Government for the purpose of recruitment of published posts.
- Qualified and competent candidates are selected on the basis of their performance in the interview before the panel of experts.
- On selection, proposals are forwarded to the university for seeking approval.
- Newly recruited faculty is made aware about the vision, mission and goals of the institute.
- Management of the College constitutes the selection committee for the selection of faculty on clock hour basis as per the guidelines of the university and State Government.

#### **Strategies for Retention:**

- Faculties are motivated and appreciated for their academic and research achievements.
- Institute authorities during their formal and informal interactions with faculty often emphasize about the informal relations among faculty themselves and also with the authorities so as to have healthy and homely environment in the college.

- Salary of the faculty is paid as per the rules and regulations of Government of Maharashtra. Remuneration of the faculty appointed on clock hour basis is also paid as per the norms of the State Government.
- Scope is given for faculty members for their career advancement through participation in orientation and refresher courses, summer and winter school programs and short duration courses organized by academic staff colleges of different universities and institutes so as to acquire necessary professional skills.
- Ample scope for faculty members to acquaint themselves about effective use of ICT in teaching learning process and research activities.

#### Following strategies adopted by the institution to enhance teacher quality:

- Orientation sessions to impart soft skills related to newer approaches in teaching learning process
- Faculty have become competent to cope with changes in the curriculum by discussing them in departmental meetings
- Motivation for effective use of multimedia and ICT tools, charts, models etc
- Awareness through meetings with office bearers about content of knowledge management, use of open educational resources and library resources, etc
- The newly appointed faculty has to undergo the training in teaching —learning methods and approaches in which they are also made acquainted with various facilities available on the campus to make their teaching more effective
- Faculty with their own experience and with discussion with senior teachers gets acquainted about selection and development of teaching learning material and its effective use.
- There is a free access to all faculty members to internet, e books, e journals by means of INFLIBNET and N-List to collect necessary material to enrich their subject content.
- Institute also sensitize faculty about socio-economic and environment related issues.
- *Vidyasabha*, as an academic think tank groom in-house academic leadership, deliberately plans annual workshops for faculty members who confidently shoulders responsibilities like teaching-learning, evaluation, research, extension, extracurricular activities, NSS, etc
- *Vidyasabha*, organize *ShikshakShibir* tri-annually for all faculty where they interact with eminent personalities from different walks of life.
- There is a provision of annual academic audit of every teacher by expert panel constituted by parent institute through personal interaction called *SanwadBaithak*.

- The institute organized 'Yoga Camp' for the staff.

## 2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of Teachers by the Student and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process.

Yes. The college has introduced method of evaluation of teacher by students and external experts.

#### **Evaluation by students:**

Feedbacks about about college are obtained from students in prescribed proforma.

#### **Evaluation by experts:**

Evaluation of teachers is done by administrative authorities by keen observation about punctuality, regularity, seriousness in discharging duties etc. Remarks of the observations are conveyed to the concerned teacher immediately and tips and suggestions are given for further improvements.

In addition to this, expert committee constituted by parent institute BharatiyaShikshanPrasarakSanstha, Ambajogai evaluates the performance of every teacher annually through academic audit, *Sanwad*.

This practice of evaluation resulted in positive impact on teaching-learning process. As a result, the faculties have become more confident, creative, positive and efficient.

#### 2.5 Evaluation process and reforms

### 2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the instituion especially students and faculty are aware of -the evaluation processes?

Evaluation process is solely designed by the university. It comprises semester wise theory examinations and annual practical examinations.

The institution aware students and faculty about the evaluation process by following ways:

- The affiliating University has its own website through which the details about the evaluation process are declared time to time; also institution publishes the examination information through its website.
- The Institution has Examination Cell. It conducts meetings and make aware about University examinations to the faculty and students.

- The faculty members read the instructions even in the classrooms and copy of the same is also displayed on the notice-board. Likewise, they are informed at the beginning of the session regarding this. Students are clearly made aware about the eligibility conditions required to appear forexamination.
- Apart from this continuous assessment of students is done by conducting group discussions, seminars, providing guidance during preparation for competitions, etc.
- The faculty members are made aware about the recent updates of the evaluation process by the written notification as well as e-notification sent by the university as well as evaluation cell of the college.
- Instructions regarding examination are displayed outside the examination hall.
- Mentor faculties inform group of students allotted to them about the evaluation process.
- Students are made aware to avoid unfair means during examination and guidelines of university in this regard are displayed on notice board.

#### Awareness among faculties about the process of evaluation:

- IQAC prepares annual academic calendar which is communicated to faculties at the beginning of academic year. Academic calendar comprises tentative schedule of internal evaluation and university evaluation.
- Evaluation cell holds periodical meetings for the smooth conduct of evaluation process.
- Staff meetings are arranged as and when required for the awareness about the evaluation reforms made by university.
- Important university circulars are circulated among faculty time to time notifying schedule of examination.
- Guidelines of university regarding duties and responsibilities of faculties in evaluation are circulated and discussed in staff meetings.
- Appointment letters regarding theory and practical examinations are issued well in advance.

## 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are thereforms initiated by the institution on its own?

Entire evaluation process is governed as per the rules and regulations of Dr. BabasahebAmbedkarMarathwada University to which college is affiliated.

#### **Evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted:**

- Semester pattern of examination for theory papers.
- Project work for T.Y. B.A. students.
- Evaluation of students in theory examinations conducted by the university.
- Use of ICT and software in collecting and analyzing data generated during evaluation.
- Use of ICT for smart evaluation processincludingmanagement of seating arrangments of candidates, downloading of question papers, uploading of marklists, etc.

- For strengthening secrecy of the examination process, the university has adopted new policy of making question papers available on uique id of the college handled by competent authority.
- Marks obtained by students in practical examination are uploaded on the link provided by the university.
- University has modified its mechanism by initiating a process of uploading marks of the assessed answerbooks at D-CAS center run at the college.

#### Reforms initiated by college on its own:

- College conduct seminars, group discussions, *viva voce* etc to evaluate performance of students
- Students are introduced to research activities by inviting their participation in activities like poster presentation, wall paper publication by referring reputed resourses.
- Students are inspired to read research articles from various resourses.
- Statistical analysis of resulting outcome of evaluation process at the end of every academic year is done for review and necessary improvements.

### 2.5.3 How does the institutionensureeffective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

College effectively implements evaluation reforms of the university and its own by following ways:

- Evaluation cell comprising teaching faculty and necessary support staff governs and implements evaluation process.
- Care is taken to make available required infrastructure for smooth conduct of examinations and evaluation.
- Sub-committees are constituted for the purpose of smooth conduct of process.
- Provision of internal vigillance Squad and Joint Cheif Superintendent appointed by university ensures the fair environment and prevent unfair means during examinations.
- College strictly follows the norms of university for the effective implementation of the process.
- All concerned are made aware time to time about guidelines of university.
- Periodical review of the process is taken by head of the institute.

## 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adapted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

#### A detail of formative assessment approaches:

- Formative assessment is done on the basis of question-answer and oral feedback method during classroom discussions. Necessary strategies are adopted accordingly for teaching learning process.
- Skills acquired by students are assessed during practical examinations, seminars, group discussion, project work and necessary suggestion and guidelines are given for further improvements.
- Slow learners are identified by observing responses of students during teaching learning and remedies are provided to them.

- Informal counseling of students to eliminate the fear of failure in examination is an outcome of formative assessment.
- Counseling also helps in creation of awareness among the students about learning with cognitive approach.
- Progress of the student in studying particular part of curriculum is assessed informally during classroom interaction.
- Building up of competence among students about self learning and making them habitual for preparation of own study material is possible with the help of formative assessment approach.

#### **Details of summative assessment approach:**

- Theory examination at the end of every semester and practical examinations are the part of summative assessment.
- Performance of the students in these is carried out by examiners appointed by the university.
- Practical examinations are conducted to assess practical skills acquired by students and also their ability of interpretations of experimental results.
- Summative assessment at the end of every semester helps to decide acquisition and sustenance of the content learned by the students.

#### **Positive impact on the system:**

- Appreciable rise in confidence level of student at the end of degree course is observed which is reflected in their progression towards future studies and successful life.
- Results of formative and summative assessment approaches led teachers to adopt various teaching methods.
- Students become capable of self learning.
- Significant improvements are observed in students with respect to behavioral pattern, infidelity about education, development of soft skills etc.
- It is a matter of pride and immense pleasure for every faculty to observe positive changes in over all development of students at the end of his three year degree course. This works as a motive for faculty in his further progression.
- 2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment duringthelastfour years and weightagesassigned for the over all development of student(Weightage for behaviour aspect, independent learning, communication skills etc.

Entire evaluation process is governed as per the rules and regulations of Dr. BabasahebAmbedkarMarathwada University, Aurangabad. Pressent evaluation system doesn't have weightage for internal assessment. This pattern does not have weightage for behavioral aspects, punctuality, etc.

- Formative assessment approach involves informal observation of improvements in behavioral aspects, independent learning and soft skills of students.
- NSS and Life Long Learning and Extension departmentsorganise activities for overall development of student and do have proper weightage for behavioural aspect, communication skill, independent learning etc.
- Visits toneghbouringconcerned industries are planed which are helpful in independent learning.

The mission of the institute is nation building through man making and character building. Institute strongly believes that education is the best tool to bring desired social transformation.

#### These attributes are achieved by

- Meticulous planning of curricular, co-curricular and extra- curricular activities.
- Organization of lectures, group discussions, field visits, surveys etc for their understanding about the social situations.
- Organization of campus and other awareness program through NSS and lifelong learning education forum.
- Organization of activities like blood donation camps, health camps in rural area, computer literacy drive etc.
- Notifying prominently in the prospectus.
- Principal during his address to fresher students appeals to achieve these attributes during their studies.
- These attributes are strongly mentioned in the introductory speech of all the functions held in the college.

### 2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with? Reference to evaluation both at the College and University level?

Mechanism for redressal of grievances regarding evaluations:-

- Evaluation process is entirely governed by the university.
- Chairman of evaluation cell personally looks into the matter of routine college level grievances of students.
- Students have to claim in stipulated time period, for photocopy of their own answer scripts and subsequently process of revaluation if required in case of grievances with reference to assessment of answer books.

- Redressal committee constituted by university solve the grievances by reassessing answer books by senior examiners.
- Revised performance is communicated to the concerned student through evaluation cell of the college.

#### 2.6. Student performance and learning outcomes

Learning outcomes are clearly mentioned in mission statement, goals and objectives of the institute. Man making through character building is the mission of the institute. Introductory lectures at the beginning of academic year are focused on addressing students to acquire desired learning outcomes by taking enough efforts with the help of teachers and peer group.

- Vidhyasabha, an academic council, of the institute plans and monitors curricular, co curricular, extra curricular, research and extension activities through various committees.
- Every teaching department prepares its own annual plan at the beginning of every academic yearwhich facilitates to achieve desired learning outcomes.
- Review of progress of the syllabus and implementation of co-curricular activities is taken periodically. Faculty member through head of the respective departments has to submit monthly, semester wise and annual reports in this regard.
- Evaluation committee headed by a senior and competent faculty is formulated to evaluate the performance of student through examination.
- Periodic review of extracurricular activities designed deliberately to inculcate certain values is taken through IQAC. IQAC/ *Vidyasabha* monitor all these curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities.

## 2.6.4 Whatarethemeasures/initiativestakenupbytheinstitutiontoEnhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

The college takes up the following measures and initiatives to enhance the social and economic relevance of the courses:

- Career guidance and placement cell, Lifelong Education and Extension Services department organize special lectures and training programs.
- Different departments organize guest lectures about career opportunities in research, industry and other fields.
- Students realize the relevance of present course when they interact with alumni of the college and other successful personalities working in different fields of life in various functions.
- Sincere efforts are made through the activities of competitive examination cell to build up competency necessary for various competitive examinations.
- Short term certificate courses in communicative English, Industrial Chemistry and Advertisement and Salesmanship are run to provide additional benefit for acquiring job.

- College laboratories are the places where students spare their time so as to explore and experiment innovatively.
- College magazine provide platform to put their innovative ideas and creations.
- College organizes industrial visits and interactions of industrial executives to instill entrepreneurship among students.
- Research aptitude among students is developed by giving them small research projects. Such projects are assigned to students of Commerce, Microbiology and Computer Science departments. Research aptitude is also developed through activities like wall paper, poster competition, participation in academic conferences and workshops, etc.
- Lifelong Education and Extension Services and NSS wings regularly organize programs to enhance social relevance of the courses.

## 2.6.5 Howdoestheinstitutioncollectandanalyzedataonstudent Performance and learning out comes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

College collects and analyzes data on student learning outcomes by following ways:

- Examination cell provides necessary data which is used for the purpose of analysis.
- At the beginning of academic year, statistical committee prepare course wise, subject wise and paper wise result analysis supported by graphs.
- Administrative staff maintains the record and provide it to the department as and when required.
- Said practice is found very useful for future planning so as to remove learning barriers for both, slow as well as advanced learners.
- Performance of the students in NSS, cultural activities, sports and other cocurricular activities is also assessed.
- Analysis of results is done and corrective steps are taken to overcome the barriers.
- In charge of the concerned activities identifies the barriers and shortcomings and reports to IQAC and the principal to make the proper planning to overcome the barriers.

The institution has a clearly defined, set mechanism to monitor the learning outcomes through:

- Compulsory attendance is taken for every lecture. Assignments and laboratory hours are fixed.

- Remarks recorded by the visitors are also indicators of the achievement of learning outcomes.

   The college has undertaken the 'Bhartiya Vivek Gram Yojana' from the year 2013. Under this scheme the village Wybhatwadi is selected for the socio- economic and educational development. The village is nearly

10 km away from Beed city and having population 800. The village is surrounded by mountains. It is facing the scarcity of water and economy of the village is totally based on cattle's and labor work. For the development of this village necessary remedies are provided.

## 4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

For the maintenance and up-keeping of the infrastructure, facilities and equipments are made through the Dead Stock committee and Maintenance Committee. Maintenance practices are classified under the headings

- Minor Repair
- Major Repair
- Emergency Repair
- Cleaning

#### • Minor Repairs

These are regular unplanned corrective maintenance operations that are carried out as and when needs arise. It may include work such as replacements, minor civil work, plumbing, electrical and carpentry fittings etc. There are specified number of years after which most of the items are replaced or disposed off by the Dead Stock committee and Maintenance Committee.

#### Major Repairs

These include major maintenance activities such as renovation, repainting, construction of classrooms etc. The committee reasonably convinces a need for any major maintenance to the Construction Committee of the institute and suggests how it will be executed considering economic aspect of the work. Quotations are invited from different contractors to carry out the up keeping the infrastructure. These quotations are scrutinized by the Construction Committee through architect and engineer and then finalized.

On approval of the budget by the Construction Committee and the Management the execution of the major repair takes place.

#### Emergency Repairs

These are maintenance works that are taken up on an immediate basis to avoid negative consequences, such as re electrification, repairing of equipments and safety measures if needed.

#### • Cleaning Operations

These are day to day operations executed to keep the campus, buildings and facilities in a clean and up-to-date condition. Administration prepares a plan for the management of available resources at the start of every year and allots the duties to respective non teaching staff for cleanliness of allotted area. Maintenance of hygienic college premises is made by out sourcing to a professional housekeeper.

## 4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/ instruments?

The institution undertakes calibration and other precision measures periodically and whenever any problem arises. During warranty period those are maintained by the suppliers and after that periodical maintenance of laboratory equipments, water cooler, computers, and electronic devices takes up with the help of respective agencies dealers and experts.

In certain cases AMC for the computers, data base server, associated software and nodal switches are provided to the service provider to maintain the system. The technicians give visit to the college periodically and on call to upkeep the equipments, microscopes etc. by its cleaning and calibrations.

## 4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

Sensitive equipments are located at appropriate and sufficient place to avoid problems in fluctuations, handling and disturbances. In the view of proper maintenance and up keeping the major steps taken includes -

#### • Voltage fluctuations

- i) Uninterrupted Power Supply units connectivity is available for the computer and other selected laboratory instruments such as UV spectrophotometer with computer interface, colorimeters, weighing pan balance, CRO, frequency generator, etc.
- ii) Appropriate power supply units and stabilizers are available for the equipments such as electrophoresis apparatus to provide required voltage and prevent voltage fluctuation.
- iii) MCB switch protection is provided at respective sites to avoid damages and hazards due to voltage fluctuations.
- iv) The sensitive instruments, such as Data Base Server are located in a dust-free area, adjacent to the Administrative Block, with separate electrical connection, having auto cut facility during high voltage, fluctuations and maintained with lightening arrester.

#### Constant water supply

- i. Water resource providing continuous water in all seasons is available.
- ii. For the availability of constant water supply an automated mechanism is installed in the water tank which facilitates the maintenance of essential water level and avoids wastage of water..
- iii. Water coolers and water purifiers with RO system have the mechanism of auto off.


Yes. The institute has a perspective plan for development. The following aspects are considered for inclusion in plan.

## **Best practice 1:**

# Title: Biodegradable Solid Waste Management Campaign:

- To inculcate the concept of sustainable development among stakeholders
- To introduce the concept and importance of solid waste management
- To introduce the 3R (reduce, recycle and reuse) concept of biodegradable waste management
- To instil responsiveness to environmental issues amongst the stakeholders
- To help to develop greenery in an eco-friendly way
- To prop up (support) carbon neutrality

#### The context:

Approximately three quarters of the municipal solid waste is biodegradable waste. In India most of the household's waste materials are disposed by throwing on roads, drainages and on open land which creates pollution. Biodegradable waste is mostly food waste, garden waste and paper, and is degraded through aerobic and anaerobically. Anaerobic processes produce methane- a potent greenhouse gas and other offensive gases. Once in the atmosphere, methane absorbs terrestrial infrared radiation that would otherwise escape to space. Methane is about 21 times more powerful at warming the atmosphere than carbon dioxide (CO2) by weight.

In case where landfill technology is used for disposal in that case along with greenhouse gas production, there are other issues associated including leaching (the leaking of potentially toxic liquids into soil and groundwater), litter (garbage of waste), pests (Vermin, rats, mice, cockroach), and the waste of valuable, recyclable goods.

Goal of institution is to develop the citizens who work for nation building. Nation builders must thought regarding the countrywide issues. Solid waste management is the major global headache with increasing population and pollution. Hence to introduce students and other stakeholders the global dilemma of solid waste management institution has undertaken biodegradable solid waste management practice at local and family level. This role model practice is named as 4 R method of solid waste Management. These 4R's are

- R Refuse to use non-degradable materials like plastic
- R Reduce the bio-waste by drying
- R Reuse the Bio-waste for plantation and
- R Recycle it in terms of greenery.

The steps adopted while executing this method of sustainable biodegradable waste management are

# Step I

Collection of the biodegradable waste from kitchen, temples and garden
 Step II

Drying the collected waste in sunlight.

## **StepIII**

- Mixing of dried waste in proper proportion for plantation There are three different plantation methods
- Sac method
- Pot method and
- Drum method

Sac method is mainly useful for growing vegetables because the sac is to be replaced periodically. Pot method is usually applied to grow small florid and gaudy bushes. And drum is useful to nurture the fruit plants like guava, chikoo, clustered apple or pomegranate along with ornate shrubbery along drum sides.

## Sac and Pot method:

Sac or pot method comprises the coconut cover beds at the bottom to hold the necessary and sufficient water; it is followed by few pebbles for air circulation. The soil bed must be covered on this base. The mixture of ten percent soil and ninety percent dried solid waste is put over this soil bed alongside of sapling. The upper layer of soil helps the mixture to decompose properly.

# Drum method

In drum method three layers of plantation are possible. The same procedure of the pot method is adopted for bottom and middle layer. The saplings are planted from the four side hole made to the bottom and middle layer of drum and in the upper most layer a fruit plant is planted in the center and herbs can be planted alongside holes.

#### **Practice:**

- In 2005 on occasion of university foundation day an invited talk was organized by Principal. The speech was so much effective. Many teachers and the former president of college committee implemented the project of biodegradable solid waste management at their houses.
- All biodegradable solid waste is used in houses who ever executing the program.
- It reduced nearly half kilogram solid waste per home per day and thus 1800 kg solid waste has decreased per year from municipal solid waste system.
- To convey the importance of this practice to the stakeholders college organized exhibition. On this occasion the wall posters, the vegetables in sac and plants in pots grown by solid waste management method used as models.
- A Video has been prepared regarding the solid waste management method and played on various occasions such as 'Traivarshik Shibir' (Tri-annual camp organized by Bhartiya Shikshan Prasarak Sanstha, Ambajogai), *Mahila Palak Melava*, Allumani meet to inspire the stakeholders.
- The teachers deliberately deliver lectures on solid waste management in society when and wherever possible.
- The group discussion was arranged by women grievance committee on this issue during women empowerment program of 'Shardotsav'.
- The attempts are being made to convey this project to the students by allotting the projects in the course of environmental science.
- The workshop for women on Solid Waste Management has been organized by women grievance committee. Women are inspired through this activity.
- This practice is being percolating among the society through mouth publicity, group discussions, lectures, video, and exhibitions and most important the practical examples executed from students to management members.
- The concept is conveyed effectively to people through social media such as Whatsapp, Facebook etc.
- On the occasion of unvailing ceremony of statue of Swatantryaveer Sawarkar exhibition regarding the work on solid waste management was arranged
- For pest management cow urine with water (1:10) is sprinkled.

## **Evidence of success:**

- A beautiful terrace garden is cultivated by the president of college committee which is an inspiration for society. This garden includes beautiful flowers and vegetables cultivated by this organic farming method.
- Also, the teachers have developed beautiful balconies and court gardens using the above mentioned method.
- Women grievance committee has under taken a pilot project of on the terrace garden of the college.

• Being inspired from this project the children of staff members adopted this project practically and participated in the Science Exhibition. Through this the concept of Solid Waste Management is spread among schools.

## **Problems Encountered**

- Drying the solid waste is very critical job as it may be ruined or may give odor if does not get sufficient sun light.
- The generation of insects like cockroach may produce difficulties.
- Most of the stakeholders do not have sufficient scientific knowledge of gardening.
- Shortage of work force to maintain the project




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

## ANNEXURE-III: UGC XII PLAN GENERAL DEVELOPMENT GRANT COPY FROM UGC





#### DRAFT REPORT ON INSTITUTIONAL ACCREDITATION OF

B. S. P. Santha's

#### Swa. Sawarkar Mahavidyalaya, Beed.

#### SECTION 1: INTRODUCTION

Swatantra veer Sawarkar Mahavidyalaya, Beed, was established in the year 1995 by Bhartiya Shiksh Prasarak Sanstha. The objective of the Sanstha in starting this College is to impart value-based education, and to inculcate self-reliance amongst the people in and around Beed district. The College is affiliated to Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad, and is a Grant-in-Aid institution. The College applied to UGC for recognition under 2f and 12B, and the matter is pending with the concerned authorities.

The College has the faculties of Arts, Social Sciences, Science and Commerce, and is offering B.A., B.Sc. and B.Com courses. It follows the annual temporal plan of academic work. The College has 25 teaching departments – 4 Language, 10 Social Science, 8 Science and 3 Commerce. The College is also preparing the students for Maharashtra State Certificate in Information Technology, under self-finance scheme. The student enrollment in all the UG courses is 945 (B A - 407, B.Sc - 325 and B Com - 213). The College has a qualified faculty of 51 teachers - 3 permanent, 1 probationary, 25 ad-hoc, 3 temporary, 16-clock hour basis and 3 contributory. Three of the teachers have Ph. D degree as the highest qualification, and two other possess M. Phil degree. 13 Nonteaching staff supports the administration in the College. The total annual budget for the academic year 2002-2003 is about Rs 51.5 lakhs, and the unit cost of education excluding the salary component works out to be Rs.1700/- per student. The College works for 287 days in an academic year, of which 180 are for teaching. The support services in the College include a Central Library, Computer Laboratory, and Grievance Redress Cell.

The College has volunteered for assessment by National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), and submitted the Self-Study Report (SSR).

Dr. Jagannath Patil, Assistant Adviser, NAAC Bangalore, coordinated the visit of the Peer Team.

The Peer Team consisting of Prof K. Kuppuswamy Rao, former Rector, Dr. B. R. Ambedkar Open University, Hyderabad, as the Chairman, and Prof P. S. N. Reddy, Department of Chemistry, Osmania University, Hyderabad, as the member coordinator, visited the College on 21<sup>st</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> January 2004 to asses the SSR. The Peer Team held discussions with the Principal, Members of the Local Management Committee and other academic constituents of the College such as the teachers, non-teaching staff, students, alumni and the parents. Based on the feedback from them, and on verification of the relevant documents, and also keeping in view the seven criteria evolved by NAAC for assessing the quality of education offered in the College, the Peer Team submits the following report to NAAC for its consideration:

#### SECTION 2: CRITERIA-WISE EVALUATION

#### Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

The College is offering B.A., B.Sc. and B. Com. Courses under 'compulsory and optional' system. The Departments of English, Marathi, Hindi, Sanskrit, History, Sociology, Political Science, Public Administration, Economics, Geography, Psychology, Philosophy, Physical Education (in the faculty of Arts and Social Sciences), Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Botany, Zoology, Computer Science (in the faculty of Science), and Advanced Accounting and Auditing, Cost Accounting and Auditing, Management accounting and Economics (in Commerce) were started at the time of establishing the College in 1995. Subsequently, the College has introduced the departments of Microbiology (in 1997), Home Science (in 2003), Music (in 2003), and Electronics (in 2003). The student thus has the option to choose the combinations of his/her choice along with English as a compulsory subject. The Peer Team is happy to note that the College is responding quickly to the market need by introducing job-oriented courses in addition to the traditional core subjects. Since these courses are semi-professional in nature, the College may provide the required laboratory infrastructure and facilities. Biotechnology,

Agricultural Science, Statistics, Journalism are some other subjects recommended for introduction in future as and when the facilities permit.

The College follows the time frame and the syllabi prescribed by the affiliating University. It is mandatory. Hence the students do not have the flexibility in time frame and for horizontal mobility in the courses. The University Act provides for Autonomy for its affiliated College. The Peer Team is of the opinion that the College may apply for autonomous status in near future.

The College is offering Certificate courses mostly related to the Computer applications, This facility may be expanded to include other socially relevant subjects like Marriage and Family Counseling, Marriage Law, Interior Design, Social Work, Child Psychology, Non-conventional energy, Water conservation, Local Management etc. Diploma courses in Industrial Analytical Chemistry, Industrial Microbiology and Environmental Sciences may also be introduced, Incidentally, these will generate additional funds to the College...

Three Teachers out of the 51 are permanent. This is a matter of concern because the temporary teachers head most of the departments that require more experienced leadership. Also, the College is not in a position to avail the opportunities provided by the University and the UGC for faculty development because of the large number of temporary teachers. This situation needs immediate attention and correction.

#### Criterion 2: Teaching-Learning and evaluation:

The minimum qualification for admission to a course in the College is a pass with 35 per cent of marks in the qualifying examination. The students are admitted to the College on first-cum-first served basis following the statutory reservations of the State and Central Governments. The ratio of applications to the sanctioned intake is 2:1. There is no provision for assessing the student's aptitude for, and merit in, a particular course before admission. The Peer Team suggests that the College may evolve a mechanism to evaluate the student's aptitude for a given course at least after his/her admission and initiate corrective action, if necessary. The College may institutionalize the conduct of remedial

and bridge courses for educationally disadvantaged students. The bright students may be provided facilities to study short time courses as value addition.

The teachers prepare a teaching plan in the beginning of the academic year and lesson notes, which are verified by the Principal. The Peer Team suggests that the syllabi might be unitized to suit the annual system of instruction. The pedagogy of teaching is mainly by lecture method that is supplemented to a small extent by charts, project work, study tours and models. The Peer Team suggests that the College may encourage the teachers to use audio-visual aids and Internet facility as a supplementary to their classroom teaching.

The College publishes its prospectus annually in which information regarding evaluation methods is disseminated to the students. Internal examinations are conducted regularly and the marks are notified to the students. In view of the recent University policy to evaluate the first and second year students internally, the College may create an examination Cell with relevant support systems, and designate a senior teacher to monitor this activity.

There are 51 teachers of which 3 are permanent and all the others are temporary under one scheme or other. A University Selection Committee selected the teachers appointed prior to 1999, but they have to pass the SET examination to become permanent. Only one teacher has cleared the test so far. After 1999, a Local Selection Committee appointed the teachers. Some teachers were appointed on Clock Hour Basis also. The selection of temporary teachers could have been more competitive. The College may sensitize its teachers about the need to qualify for a Ph D degree or pass the SET examination to correct this problem of temporary teachers.

The College does not have any formal method of appraising the teachers. It may introduce self-appraisal and students evaluation methods for assessing the teachers and monitor their performance regularly. Twenty-two teachers have attended conferences, and the College conducted three regional workshops. The Principal of the College was a

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former Chairman, Board of Studies in Botany in Dr B.R.Ambedkar Marthwada University.

#### Criterion 3: Research, Consultancy and Extension

The College offers under graduate courses only, and hence no research activity is visible. The Principal of the College is a Ph D in Botany, and is a recognized supervisor for guiding Ph D students. Two other teachers have Ph D degree, and six more are pursuing Ph D as part-time research scholars. Two teachers possess M Phil degree. Some teachers have the potential to conduct research, but the college infrastructure does not permit them. The College may encourage them to submit minor research proposals to the funding agencies by providing some seed money. The temporary nature of the teachers is an impediment for establishing any research base in the College.

There is no consultancy in the College. But the teachers of Psychology, Microbiology and Chemistry have been advising the community in an informal way regarding the quality of drinking water, blood analysis and emotional problems of the adolescent girls.

The extension activities of the College include community development, social work, health and hygiene awareness, medical camp, adult education and literacy, blood donation camp, AIDS awareness, water conservation, laying of road and environmental awareness. They are conducted by the NSS, NCC and various other Associations in the College. The College promotes the students to write and edit a wall paper named "Gaurav", and published a magazine called "Kaustubh" in the year 2003. One teacher is an honorary editor of a monthly magazine called "Lokyadnya"

The Peer Team suggests that the College may adopt a nearby village for all those activities mentioned above, and plan to work with NGO's and GO's.

#### Criterion 4: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College is located in a rented building in a residential locality. It has no compound wall and the residents use the premises as a thoroughfare. A part of the College that houses the NSS, NCC and Adult Education units is on the upstairs of a small house nearby. All the rooms including the laboratories are undersized. The entire ambience is not reminiscent of a degree College. The Management Committee informed the Peer Team that they propose to construct a building on their own land and shift the College shortly.

The College timetable is framed in such a way that the classes are conducted in shifts, and use the laboratories at times as classrooms. The departments of Botany and Zoology share the same laboratory. It is the case with Physics and Electronics as also Psychology and Geography. The Chemistry laboratory is also used occasionally by the Junior College run by the same Sansthan. The apparatus and equipment in the laboratories is below the minimal standard requirement in comparison to the student strength in the relevant subject. Also, the Microbiology laboratory requires additional equipment for imparting training to the students at the desired standards.

The College offers Computer Science as one of the electives. The computer laboratory is located in the cellar of the building with 12 computers connected by LAN. It also serves as a resource center for the College. The Peer Team is of the opinion that the configuration and the facility need updating to meet the demands of the large number of student strength in the College.

The Library is located in a room of the size 8' x 14'. It works for 6 days a week. There is no separate Reading Room facility for the students. The Library has about 5000 books that include reference books. It has no reprography facility; audio and

videocassettes, Internet, open access system, and the services are yet to be computerized.

The Library has an Advisory Committee that monitor its functioning.

The College has no playground of its own. It conducts its sports and activities in a nearby stadium. The College organized the inter-College chess tournament in 2003. The College is runners-up in the event. Two students are selected for the University Chess team. Students participate in various Local, District and Regional level events of sports regularly. Meritorious students are facilitated on the foundation day. The Peer Team suggests the College may develop a playground of its own when it moves to the proposed new campus and provide professional training in games and sports to the talented students.

#### Criterion 5: Student Support and Progression:

Nearly 50 per cent of the students appear for the qualifying examination after the minimum period of study. The average success rate is about 80 per cent, which is much higher than the university average. Several students of the College obtained University ranks in the final examination.

The dropout rate is about 40 per cent, which is rather high. The familial custom of marrying the girls at young age and the migratory nature of the sugar-cane cutters are cited as the possible reasons. The Peer Team suggest that the Sociology and Psychology departments of the College may undertake a project to analyze scientifically the gender divide, and the reasons, for the high dropout.

Two former students of the College have qualified in the UGC-CSIR (NET) and MPSC examinations. Several others have progressed to become teachers, lecturers, journalists, judiciary, entrepreneurs and employees in public sector under-takings.

Several students of the College receive merit and merit-cum means scholarships from the Central Government and State Government. The amount is disbursed to the recipients promptly.

Recently, the College has started an employment cell to disseminate the information to students on employment opportunities. Also, the teachers of the College impart academic and personal counseling to the needy students. The College has an Alumni association, which is yet to be registered. There is student-teacher-parent association to discuss the problems of the students.

The College publishes a prospectus every year containing all the relevant information necessary for a student seeking admission. The recreational facilities in the College include indoor games, outdoors games, nature clubs, debate clubs, student magazine, cultural programs, Arogyasadhana and Dhyan Dharana.

The Peer Team suggests that the College may the college has covered all the students under "Health Insurance and Scheme". The College provides canteen and drinking water facilities. Since the College is coeducational and the number of students is nearly 1000, the existing toilet facilities need improvement.

#### Criterion 6: Organization and Management

Bhartiya Shikshan Prasarak Sanstha that established this College runs 35 other educational intuitions in and around Beed district. The Executive council of the Sanstha is supreme and all major decisions concerning the College need its approval. The Sanstha appointed a Local Management Council to monitor the functioning of all its instuitions is Beed. Thus the administrative and financial activities of the College are monitored by the LMC through the Principal. Policies regarding academic planning, examinations, budget, and curricular and co-curricular activities are internally formulated by several coordinating committees, and are informed to LMC.

The annual budget of the College for the academic year 2002-03 is about Rs.51.00 lakhs that includes the Grants expected from the State Government. The expenditure for the corresponding year is shown as Rs 17.28 Lacks. The audit report for the academic years 2001-02 and 2002-03 also indicates a surplus budget for the College. The Peer Team

suggests that the budget provision for the departments and supports services be indicated in the budget, and the amount be utilized completely.

There is a total of 13 Non-teaching staff of which 3 works in the College office and the rest in Laboratories. The office Superintendent and the Principal monitors the functioning of the non-teaching staff. The College is planning to computerize the office records, and the same may be completed on priority. Though there is no formal professional development program meant for the non-teaching staff of the College separately, the Sanstha has recently conducted an orientation program for all the employee of its instuitions.

The Tuition fee in the College for Grant-Aid courses is Rs. 1075/- (for B.A), Rs.975/- (for B. Com) and Rs. 1175/- (for B. Sc). There has been no change in the tuition fee in the last three years. There are no welfare programs as such in the College, but the Credit Co-operative Society of the employees extends loan facility to its members. The College has a Grievance redress cell.

#### Criterion 7: Healthy Practices

The Peer Team observed that the College has been observing certain other healthy practices that deserve mention in the report. They are as follows:

The College has instituted a mechanism for the internal quality check by constituting various Committees for consultancy, self-finance courses, publicity and public relations, employment guidance, literary and cultural activities.

The College has initiated self-finance courses by offering computer oriented certificate courses. The same may be extended to new combinations of electives at the undergraduate program also.

The College organizes various programs like debating competitions, essay writing, fine arts, sports, yoga, meditation, and speech competition for students as part of their

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personality development. Also, the students are exposed to lectures by eminent people and are encouraged to participate in annual social gathering and youth festival.

The College also organizes programs for community development through its NCC, NSS and Adult Literacy Units. Tree plantation, "Sant Gadgae Baba Gram Swachata Abhiyan", Anti addiction, Dowry workshops, on "Sakaratmaka Jivan" (Positive Thinking) Rain water harvesting, Youth for water conservation, Construction of percolation tanks in rural areas, Awareness regarding water conservation among the peoples, Environmental water pollutions awareness, are a few examples in this context.

#### SECTION 3: OVERALL ANALYSIS.

After assessing the SSR by interacting with the Management, Principal, the teaching faculty, non teaching employees, students, alumni, and parents; and verification of all the relevant documentary evidence, The Peer Team is happy to observe that the process of quality movement is initiated by the College. The same may be vigorously pursued. The College has some strengths and healthy practices for imparting quality education. At the same time, there are some areas of concern that require immediate attention. These include accommodation, infrastructure, class room and laboratory facilities, library facilities, high teacher-student ratio in language subjects, large number of temporary teachers, high drop out rate, The peer team suggests the following recommendations to the College for consideration in order to translate its motto "Kelyane Hote Ahe Re Adhi Kelechi Pahije" into action, and to achieve its objective of providing quality education.

- □ The College may shift its premises to a spacious building in a congenial locality.
- ☐ The College may apply to the University for Autonomous Status.
- □ The temporary teachers may be encouraged to qualify for permanent status.
- The demand for the existing courses is to be reviewed, and necessary corrective measures be initiated.
- The infrastructure facilities in the laboratories, classrooms and library are to be improved substantially.
- Separate reading room is to be provided for the students.

- Remedial classes and Bridge courses be conducted on a regular basis for improving the communication skills, particularly in spoken English, among the students and the teachers.
- Laboratories for teaching language, social science and commerce subjects be established.
- □ Museums for the departments of Zoology, Geography and History be provided.
- □ The library services be computerized and the number of textbooks and reference books may be increased.
- Use of Internet facilities and Audiovisual Aids may be encouraged by teachers to supplement their classroom teaching.
- A formal "Examination Cell" the required support systems and a be be made as in charge to monitor the evaluation process.
- The computer laboratory be enlarged and updated with legal software for providing access to all the students.
- Sports facilities for both outdoor and indoor games are to be augmented.

The Peer Team opines that the above recommendations will help the College to achieve the desired quality in its academic programs.
